

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

ON THE ADAMANT

This year's coveted Golden Bear, the Berlin Film Festival's highest honor, went to a film about a boat, the Adamant, moored permanently on the Seine in the center of Paris. Resembling a cross between a Mississippi steamboat and an alien craft covered with louvered windows, the Adamant is, in fact, a day-care center for mentally challenged adults-part art studio, library, performance space, and screening room-whose visitors curate their own film festivals. As Peter Bradshaw wrote in *The Guardian*, "There is enormous warmth, sympathy and human curiosity in this film."

ABOUT DRY GRASSES

The most recent epic from master Turkish director, Nuri Bilge Ceylan, is, as the New York Film Festival describes, "a work of elegant, novelistic filmmaking, rigorously unpacking questions of belief versus action, the tangible versus the enigmatic, and who we wish to be versus how we live." Samet, an art teacher in an Anatolian grade school, is accused of inappropriate behavior by a female student. Merve Dizdar, who won the Best Actress Award at Cannes, memorably plays Samet's colleague, Nuray.

FOOD AND COUNTRY

Food guru Ruth Reichl joins us to screen and discuss her documentary on the precarious state of our independent food chain, thrown into relief by the onslaught of Covid that dramatically disrupted business-as-usual. The film casts a wide net. Interviews with a colorful array of ranchers, farmers, restaurateurs, and chefs noodle a variety of issues including consolidation in the meatpacking and beef industries, the disenfranchisement of Black farmers, and factory farming, with Reichl all the while serving as a companionable and knowledgeable guide. Writer/director Todd Graff based his upstate fictionalization of his own experiences at Stagedoor Manor, a theater summer camp for teenagers in the Catskills. This charming and affecting mockumentary about kids who love musicals and the stage, the counselors who guide them, and the director who must balance the books, also boasts a rare film appearance by the late great master of the American musical, Stephen Sondheim himself. In 2003 The New York Times wrote, "...its spark of enthusiasm is so infectious that you have to love it for its faults."

Solanas, a hooker and the angry author of *The SCUM Manifesto*, was trying to get Warhol to produce her play, *Up Your Ass*, but apparently decided to off him instead. Lili Taylor is heart stopping as Solanas. Look for Michael Imperioli, pre-*Sopranos*, in a small role, as well as a roque's gallery of riveting actors.

May December is the latest from indie extraordinaire Todd Haynes whose features have been distributed, and in this case co-produced by Killer Films since 1991. It is based on a true story: the tabloid romance between a wife whose husband, the former student she seduced, is 23 years younger. When an actress playing the wife in an upcoming Hollywood production joins them and their three girls to research her role, tensions flair. Starring Natalie Portman and Julianne Moore, May December premiered at Cannes, and opened the New York Film Festival.

THE BOY AND THE HERON

The latest creation of Academy Award-winner Hayao Miyazaki and Studio Ghibli is setting international box office records for its visually lush, innovative work. This animated film is about a boy who, during the war, loses his mother in a fire. When he moves with his father to the countryside, he befriends a pesky heron who claims his mother is alive and leads him to an abandoned tower in the woods. There they discover an alternate, magical world that reveals his mother's secret. Played the New York and Toronto festivals.

It sold millions of copies, but by 2000, Hite was all but forgotten. Nicole Newnham, known for her awarded doc, *Crip Camp*, explores the how and whys in this ever surprising, sympathetic, and time shifting investigation. Played the Sundance Film Festival.

THE GOLDMAN CASE

Although he confessed to armed robberies in Paris in the late 60s, Pierre Goldman, a left-wing intellectual, claimed himself innocent of the murder of two pharmacists during one of them.

Sentenced to life imprisonment in jail, he wrote "Obscure Memories of a Polish Jew Born in France", which won him a second trial. This riveting courtroom drama, taken from the actual transcripts, is breathlessly compelling. Opened the Directors' Fortnight at Cannes.

A French film about food? Absolutely. Both a sumptuous drama and an adult love story set in 1885, Le Pot-au-Feu won Cannes' Best Director award for Tran Anh Hung. It's a feast, so do not come hungry.

In 2016 Nicolette Krebitz made an unusual love story about a young woman and a wolf. Krebitz's most recent provocation, a zesty romantic comedy that questions the nature of desire and commitment is about an older woman who is a speech therapist, and her student, an orphaned teenage delinquent who recognizes that his teacher is the woman he tried to rob.

ORLANDO, MY POLITICAL BIOGRAPHY

Winner of four prizes at the Berlin Film Festival, this fleet and surprisingly endearing modern take on Virginia Woolf's classic *Orlando*, imagines the trans filmmaker, Paul B. Preciado, "auditioning" about two dozen non-binary and trans people for roles in an adaptation of the novel in which a nobleman becomes a woman and lives for another three hundred years. Inclusive, slightly delirious, and yet serious, this reading of gender and its possibilities is irresistible. Also played the Toronto and New York festivals.

THE TEACHERS' LOUNGE

A rash of thefts unsettles a German secondary school when the school strikes back with a witch-hunt that targets a racially vulnerable student who turns out to be innocent. Meanwhile, an idealistic teacher singles out an administrator as the possible culprit. Her son, in turn, retaliates with a vicious whispering campaign against his mother's accuser. The film is a closely observed study of pathological paranoia, while serving as an allegory to a variety of nasty social movements given to scapegoating their enemies. Or maybe not, since no one's guilt, or innocence is firmly established. Germany's entry for Best International Feature Film at the 2024 Oscars.

Anselm Keifer, painter and sculptor, and Wim Wenders, filmmaker, were both born in Germany in 1945 – the former during the war, the latter after it. Keifer's art is informed by German history; Wender's is very much in the present. Each is a major artist, and Wenders' 3D film, in exploring the awesome spatial dimension of Keifer's monumental works, lends them a literal and wondrous depth. At its Cannes premiere. Variety described the film as "a study of a man's soul".

The cheerless Finnish title of Aki Kaurismaki's latest deadpan comedy translates as "Dead Leaves," but no filmmaker other than he can make dreariness shine so brilliantly and carry weight so lightly. Winner of the Cannes jury prize, *Fallen Leaves* is an irresistible love story about two "lost" souls and a dog who find one another. Finland's entry for Best International Feature Film at the 2024 Oscars.

MOUNTAINS

In Miami, Javier, a leader in its Haitian community, works demolishing homes in gentrifying neighborhoods. At home he speaks Creole, but his son, Junior, speaks English, has no job and a secret. He does comedy at a local club riffing on his family. Monica Sorelle, born in Miami of Haitian descent, catches the contradictions of the American dream with an amazing sympathy and an astonishing understanding of their complexities. Played Tribeca.

Once at home he is unpleasantly surprised, and must, against his will, deal with a disputed inheritance. His new friend becomes an ally. 

A gay love story that turns into a ghost story when the main character, revisiting the town in which he grew up, encounters his parents and hashes out his issues, untroubled by the fact that they're dead, killed in a car crash when he was 12. The *LA Times* called it "haunting and heartbreaking... [I]t marries sly conceptual daring and fearless emotionalism with masterly assurance." Played the Telluride, London, and New York festivals.

SHTTL

The missing "e" in *shtetl* represents absence. This remarkable film in Yiddish seems to be made in one shot, to signify the vibrancy of *shtetl* life. An energetic love story propels the action that hurtles toward catastrophe. Set on June 21, 1941, the day before the Nazis invaded, the *shtetl*, located on the western border of the Soviet Union, was wholly "recreated" by the film's French producer in Ukraine and is now an open-air museum as yet undamaged by Russian missiles.

DESPERATE SOULS AND THE LEGEND OF MIDNIGHT COWBOY

How is it that the schmaltzy *Sound of Music* could win ten Oscars in 1966, and two years later a gritty film carrying an X rating about a guy who comes to New York City to be a sex hustler could win Best Picture. Times change, and this is what Nancy Buirski captures vividly using archival footage and interviews with actor Jon Voight, Bob Balaban, and Brenda Vaccaro, cinematographer Adam Holender, screenwriter Waldo Salt's daughter Jennifer, and director John Schlesinger's nephew Ian Buruma. FilmColumbia honors Nancy Buirski, the award-winning documentary filmmaker who died August 30, and whose work was frequently shown at FC with this memorial screening.

CALL ME DANCER

Winner of the Audience Award at Berkshire International and selected to open Lincoln Center's Dance on Film Festival, Call Me Dancer was shot over several years in India, Israel, England and the US. It follows the evolution of a young Mumbai street dancer, Manish Chauhan, as he learns both classic and contemporary dance at the hands of Yehuda Maor, a retired dancer, now a demanding and feisty teacher, who becomes his champion. Although injury and COVID intervene, Manish's extraordinary talent and immense charm survive and excel.

JOAN BAEZ I AM A NOISE

In an era when, streaming-spoiled, many films are too long, Variety laments that this one's "chief sin [is] that it doesn't run about a half-hour longer." Initially, I Am a Noise plays like a fascinating, if somewhat conventional, glimpse of the life and times of the superstar folk singer who embodied the essence of the 60s (and "discovered" Bob Dylan), until it plunges into darkness when Baez makes the startling claim that she might have been sexually abused by her father, and reveals an addiction to qualludes, as well as persistent panic attacks. Co-directed by part-time local resident Miri Navasky, who will be on hand for a Q&A. Played the Berlin Film Festival.

Thien An Pham's spellbinding feature, hailed by *Variety* as the most auspicious debut film at Cannes, won the festival's coveted Camera d'Or for best first film. A young man from Saigon drives his sisterin-law's body and his 5-year-old nephew back to their mountainside home village for a Christian burial. Along the way he confronts his past and invents his future. Played Toronto and New York festivals.

HIDDEN MASTER: THE LEGACY OF GEORGE PLATT LYNES

A minister's son educated at the Berkshire School in Sheffield, MA, George Platt Lynes (1907–1955) became one of America's earliest fashion photographers, adored by society and celebrities. His art, however, was private: he photographed, magnificently and explicitly, the male nude, thousands of them, at a time when he could not exhibit his work nor send it through the US mail. Hidden Master is a buzzy and revelatory documentary about a man whose passion was ahead of its time, and whose work now resides in museums, private collections, and the Kinsey Institute in Indiana.

EVER DEADLY

This is the weirdest title for a thrilling film about a marvelous artist, Tanya Tagaq, a contemporary Inuk throat singer from Nunavut who uses punk rock and electronic music in her concerts. Opening with an astonishing throat duet by Tagaq and Laakkuluk Williamson Bathory, the film segues into a biography of Tagaq, a celebration of the northern landscape and its way of life, a critical look at Canada's colonial history, and footage of Tagaq's remarkable performances all accompanied by animation from fellow Inuit artists.

This charming, animated film is about the perils of commitment for men who misunderstand women. Zelma, born in Siberia, lived in Latvia, and spent time in New York City, has had several catastrophic marriages. Her biography of disappointment is narrated by one of her brain cells, accompanied by a singing trio who pop up whenever it expresses itself. My Love Affair with Marriage is persuasively voiced by, among others, filmmaker Signe Baumane, Dagmar Dominczyk, Matthew Modine, and Columbia County's Stephen Lang. Played Tribeca.
